Good afternoon. I am delighted to be here on behalf of The National Gas Company of Trinidad and Tobago to congratulate the graduates of the Outboard Boat Engine Repairs and Building Construction Technology programmes.

NGC is extremely pleased to sponsor these training and educational programmes. Over the past twenty years, we have built a legacy of social responsibility to the people of Trinidad and Tobago.
