Another benefit of NGC Sanfest is the school and community spirit it can create. It's heartening to see students come out to cheer on their classmates or to hear schools announcing their students' results during morning assembly. Communities also experience

excitement when seeing one of their own highlighted by the media. Papers suddenly become collector's items and parents are inundated with calls from friends, family and neighbours who see the story run. Articles like these uplift communities and here I really must thank the media for the increased coverage it has been giving NGC Sanfest this year.

The third benefit of NGC Sanfest is its role in preserving our national heritage. At NGC Sanfest, the audience can be serenaded by steel bands, young Calypsonians or paranderos. They can hear the stories of Anansi or witness a variety of folk dances. They can feel the rhythms of Afro-Caribbean drumming or of Tassa. So much of what makes Trinidad & Tobago a unique and vibrant nation is captured in the categories and topics explored in NGC Sanfest. Getting the youth excited about our history and culture is great news for the future of our nation.

It is because of these benefits – individual development, community spirit and national heritage preservation – that NGC sponsors Sanfest.
