NGC Bocas Lit Fest among the Top 20 Literary Festivals Worldwide

For the past seven years, the NGC Bocas Lit Fest has been one of NGC's flagship 'investments' within its CSR programme.

The festival's scope and popularity (both regionally and internationally) have grown substantially since its inception. This year, the NGC Bocas Lit Fest was named among the world's top 20 literary festivals by Penguin Random House – The Writers' Academy. This tribute cemented the Festival's significance as a forum for creative thinking, poetry readings, idea generation, intellectual discussion and open debate.

The festival was held during the period April 26th to 30th, 2017 at the National Library and the adjoining Old Fire Station, Port of Spain. During this period, a host of interesting and thought-provoking events took place.

This year's festival saw over 50 regional authors and speakers taking part in the programme, including Dr. the Honourable Keith C. Rowley, Prime Minster, joined the NGC Bocas Lit Fest for a candid, compelling session on his recently published memoir, From Mason Hall to Whitehall. The one-on-one session was facilitated by the festival's Deputy Director, award-winning writer, Mr. Funso Aiyejina,

on April 27th, 2017 at the Old Fire Station. The festival's five-day period featured panel discussions on issues such as human rights, press freedom, and the criminal justice system.

The festival's programme has grown each year, with this year seeing the inclusion once again of the CineLit Film Festival which featured Latin American films based on books.

An international judging panel also announced the winners of the three publication categories:

- Poetry: Cannibal by Safiya Sinclair (University of Nebraska Press)
- Fiction: Augustown by Kei Miller (Weidenfeld and Nicolson)
- Non-Fiction: Virtual Glimpses into the Past/A Walk Back in Time: Snapshots of the History of Trinidad and Tobago by the late Angelo Bissessarsingh (Queen Bishop Publishing).

NGC's involvement in the NGC Bocas Lit Fest has proven to be one of our most successful partnerships, reaching thousands of people throughout Trinidad and Tobago and providing a platform for Caribbean writers to develop, be recognised and ultimately add to the rich tradition in literature that already exists. Winner of the 2017 OCM Bocas Prize was Kei Miller which was announced on April 29th, 2017 at a special ceremony.

Gonzales Sheikers Music Literacy Programme

In the community of Gonzales located in Belmont, lies the Gonzales Sheikers Steel Orchestra Pan Theatre. The theatre was constructed by NGC in 2015 for the purpose of fostering pan literacy, facilitating entrepreneurial activities by the band and providing a space where the youth in the community could engage in learning activities.

Band Manager of the Gonzales Sheikers Steel Orchestra, Fitzroy Lewis, said, "We are very grateful for NGC's support over the years. Construction of the pan theatre has resulted in some changes in the community. We are now seeing more youth interested in playing pan and parents are becoming more involved since they are seeing the benefits in their children by keeping them occupied and away from negative influences."

One of the learning activities provided by the Gonzales Sheikers Steel Orchestra was a music literacy programme for children in the community. The programme started on Monday 10th April 2017 and ran for two weeks. The aim of the music literacy programme is to allow players and members of the community to learn to play the instrument, as well as read sheet music.

This project allows the band to develop a cadre of players to increase their competitiveness in competitions, as well as provide an opportunity for community engagement which is especially important in communities like Gonzales where there are several negative influences targeting the youth.

Tutor of the music class, Clive Telemaque, said, "We have a good turnout this year, about 20 students participated in the programme. The music classes are having an impact on the youth. Besides learning a valuable skill, the programme is keeping them off the streets and doing something productive". A student in the music class, Harmony Clinton, said, "I like music and want to take it further. Also, I like attending lessons because I am learning something I love and having fun."

The Gonzales Sheikers Steel Orchestra Pan Theatre is also used to facilitate sporting activities. Members of the community play table tennis and gym activities are held three days of the week. Additionally, there is a small cafeteria which generates income for some badly needed items such as a TV and sound system.

Wealth Generation Funds were made available for the band to invest in entrepreneurial initiatives. These initiatives were approved based on suitable projected returns and entrepreneurial spirit, as well as long-term sustainability. On Saturday 15th April 2017, the band held a cake sale to raise funds. In the future, the band hopes to construct a computer room for IT classes.

A graduation ceremony for 10 students was held on May 13th, 2017 at 3:30 pm in the Gonzales Sheikers Steel Orchestra Pan Theatre. In attendance were Community Relations Officer, NGC, Fofi George, and officials from the Gonzales Sheikers, Tutor of the music class, Clive Telemaque, and Band Manager of the Gonzales Sheikers Steel Orchestra, Fitzroy Lewis.

Sponsorship of this steelband allows NGC to strengthen its national commitment to the instrument as a means of fostering community solidarity, youth development, and entrepreneurial spirit and increasing brand visibility in furtherance of NGC's CSR objectives.

NGC Trinidad and Tobago Sweet Tassa Group Launches Tassa Academy

The NGC-sponsored Trinidad and Tobago Sweet Tassa Band launched The T&T Sweet Tassa Academy on March 18th, 2017 located at Mt. Stewart Village, Princes Town. This was a great achievement for T&T Sweet Tassa whose mission is to tutor persons interested in learning tassa drumming.

While NGC is not directly involved in the operations of the academy, the band created the programme from attending NGC's Capacity-Building Programme. The band used the fundamentals of the programme to conceptualise the academy. The Tassa Academy officially opened and commenced in January. The academy is open to all age groups and is committed to teaching tassa at various schools and institutions. In the future, the academy hopes it will become an accredited learning institution in the country.

Founder and Manager of NGC T&T Sweet Tassa, Mr. Lenny Kumar, praised NGC for providing the foundation for the establishment of the academy. He said, "Our sponsor – NGC – guided us in the right direction through its unique Capacity-Building Programme.



The programme has helped us develop and strengthen our skill-set to be able to adapt and thrive in this fast-changing world". He gave a brief background on the genesis of the academy remarking, "I have taught at many primary and secondary schools, organisations nationally and internationally, and held master classes at universities in the United States. Now, I have decided to create my legacy by opening this academy to help persons develop their interest and talent in this art form. The art of tassa drumming is a test of coordination. When persons are taught the instrument they develop the skills of creativity, rhythm and innovativeness."

Vance River Recreational Facility Upgrade

NGC, along with the Vance River Village Council, hosted a ceremonial opening on Wednesday 15th February 2017 to mark the official handover of the Vance River Recreational Facility to the Siparia Regional Corporation and Vance River Village Council. This was one of several projects started and completed in various communities, which were impacted during the construction of the 56-inch-diameter Cross Island Pipeline Project (CIPP) in the 2003-2004 period.

While it was long in coming to fruition, the upgrade of the Vance River Recreational Facility included:

- Sport pavilion, inclusive of offices, seating area, washrooms and storage area
- Construction of drains around basketball court, front of the pavilion
- · Construction of car park and roadway
- · Construction of water tank stand
- Refurbishment and upgrade of existing basketball court, including fencing

- Construction of septic tank system
- Construction of wheelchair access for pavilion

Patrice Edwards, a member of the Vance River Village Council, said that "Before the upgraded and completed facility was handed over to the community, we were not very active. Only a limited number of events were held at the community centre". She went on to say that, "The recreational facility is now being used for basketball and netball and the courts are now filled with young people from the village. The kids are coming out and playing games, young people are running on the fields and now, we have older people who are walking, which did not happen before".

The Vance River Village Council manages the facility, overseeing the everyday activities held there. Ms. Edwards stated, "The facility is used by schools, church groups and groups wanting to hold meetings. We have also opened our doors to requests from outside our community. Our new facility has brought some sunshine to our community."

The Vance River Recreational Facility is a launching pad for sporting careers. The upgraded facility will serve to provide increased opportunities for many more generations to come. Even more gratifying is the fact that this community refurbishment project not only rejuvenated a landmark facility but secured a training ground for future athletes in the area. At the handover, the Councillor said he was overjoyed to have the facility in the community.

Convert and Save with CNG

It is now easier to convert and save with CNG as a fuel for your vehicle. Earlier this year, the Ministry of Energy and Energy Industries licensed two more CNG converters. They are Burmac CNG located on Gaston Street in Chaguanas and Dumore Enterprises, Belle Vue Industrial Estate, South Oropouche.

Both companies have a long history in the automotive sector in Trinidad and Tobago and venturing into the CNG conversion business has expanded their offerings. Burmac CNG is offering conversions for both gasoline and diesel vehicles, while Dumore Enterprises is only concentrating on gasoline conversions at this time.

In January, two new CNG supply points were opened. They are NP Carrousel at Mon Repos Roundabout in San Fernando and NP Ramco Eastbound on the Churchill Roosevelt Highway in Orange Grove. These two openings brought to eight, the number of CNG stations open and available to the public, with several more

expected to be opened in 2017 and 2018, including NP Starlite in Diego Martin, NP Chaguanas Main Road and NP Tumpuna Road, Arima. All new CNG stations in Trinidad and Tobago will be outfitted with state-of-the-art equipment, which can fill approximately 700 vehicles per day. A fill up in a regular sedan only takes three minutes.

In May this year, the NGC CNG Company Limited also made a series of incentives available for taxi drivers, maxi taxi drivers and drivers of private school buses. A registered taxi driver who converts his vehicle to run on CNG can receive \$5,000 in free fuel via a fuel card. A registered maxi taxi driver who converts his vehicle, which is four years or newer, will receive \$30,000 if it is a large maxi taxi or \$20,000 if it is a small maxi taxi. The same incentive is given for any maxi taxi. which is converted that is older than four years; the owner will receive \$30,000 in free CNG for a large maxi taxi or \$20,000 for a small maxi. For yellow school buses, anyone who is a registered member of the Private School Transport Association of Trinidad and Tobago (PSTATT) can receive \$15,000 in free CNG if they buy an OEM CNG bus or \$7,500 if they convert their existing school bus. All incentives and grants must be applied for from the NGC CNG Company Limited and approvals are subjected to explicit terms and conditions.

With new converters available, opening of more stations, grants and incentives on offer, it is definitely easier to switch and save with CNG.

Extending HSSE to the Community

Health, Safety, Security and the Environment (HSSE) is at the heart of everything we do at The NGC Group of Companies, as it ensures the sustainability of our people, processes and property. National Energy is party to the NGC Group's HSSE policy which aims to achieve 'zero unsafe behaviours' and as a responsible corporate citizen, the Company is extending this philosophy to its fenceline community of Couva.

Through its Loss Prevention & Sustainability (LPS) Department, National Energy is helping to provide a safer environment for the students and teachers of Milton Presbyterian Primary School. In January this year, the Corporate Communication & Administration (CC&A) Department met with the principal of the school and noted several areas for improvement. When approached by CC&A, the LPS Department did not hesitate to get

involved, conducting a site inspection at the school and providing recommendations for HSSE enhancements.

One of the recommendations was that safety signage be installed throughout the compound including 'Children Playing' and 'Reverse Parking' signs. LPS also made recommendations for the installation of speed bumps on the roadway at the entrance of the school to ensure that motorists slow down at the pedestrian crossing.

In April 2017, National Energy was pleased to instal the signage which will help raise HSSE awareness among all who attend and visit the school daily. Through this positive step and


